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FOREWORD FROM THE DIRECTOR OF SOVEREIGN TRUST (MALTA) LIMITED



Welcome to The Sovereign Art Foundation Students Prize for Malta and Gozo Catalogue for 2024.

Artificial Intelligence or AI has been one of the most talked about and indeed debated subjects over the past year from the speed of its development and the question of how far it will go and how we control it to the ethics of its use in the creative process.

With a reasonably short and well thought out prompt it is possible to produce a visually stunning illustration; however, is it really art? I asked ChatGPT to define art and here is the reply; "Art is a profound expression of humanity, a testament to our creativity, imagination, and capacity for emotional connection. It is a mirror reflecting the complexities of the human experience and a bridge connecting diverse cultures and perspectives". So, in short, rather than a series of algorithms, art is a form of self-expression. It is a way of communicating our feelings and emotions.

The Sovereign Art Foundation was established on the premise that children who have suffered abuse, deprivation and other hardships should be allowed a safe space in which to communicate their feelings when these cannot be put into words. Children need to have an outlet with which to express their feelings or even anxieties. The programs sponsored by the Foundation provide such a safe space for kids and even their parents and carers to learn together and experience a form of therapy which in turn helps them make sense of the world.

We are immensely proud to say that over the past 20 years the Foundation has raised funds in the amount of \$11 million USD. This funding has helped us to provide much needed assistance to children in some of the most impoverished areas of the world through the Foundation's 'Make it Better' program. Part of our work here in Malta is to support and promote these programs in addition to raising awareness of the need for similar programs in Malta.

In 2022 The Sovereign Art Foundation of Malta partnering with Camp Willingness in sponsoring children to take part in their Summer Camps. This was possibly in part through funds raised from the sales of prints and postcards featuring the art of Malta's talented art students. Many of these prints are still available and can be obtained through Sovereign's team in Malta. In addition to this fundraising, The Sovereign Art Foundation in

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Malta is very proud to be able to award prize money not only to the students who enter the art prize but also to the school art departments supporting them.

The Student Art Prize continues to receive support from students and teachers alike, without which the event would not be as successful as it is. The quality of the art submitted continues to astound the judges and presents quite a challenge for them in selecting a winner. In terms of numbers the Student Prize for our seventh year received more than 149 entries from 23 different schools. This is a record for us and something for which I wish to express my heartfelt thanks to the students and teachers. The subject matter for the work again covers a rich diversity of subjects from portraiture to landscapes, introspection to the surreal and even some observations of progress in Malta from the point of view of the next generation.

To date Sovereign has been very pleased to award cash prizes to winning schools and to their students in the amount of €17,800 along with consolation prizes. For this year's prize the winning schools are set to receive €2,300 toward the development of their art departments and for the winning students, a total cash prize of €800 to reward their efforts.

The entries from the Student Prize 2024 will go on to compete in the 2025 Global Students Prize competing against prize winners from seven other countries. Malta has won twice in this global event giving unparalleled international exposure for both student and their artwork

I began this foreword by discussing Al so perhaps I should let ChatGPT make the final comment on our finalist exhibition for this year; "As we marvel at the ingenuity and innovation on display, let us also recognize the enduring power of art to provoke thought, evoke emotion, and inspire action. In the face of uncertainty, artists continue to illuminate the path forward, reminding us of our shared humanity and the boundless possibilities of the creative imagination".

Finally, I wish to give my heartfelt thanks to all those who entrusted us with their entries, to the schools who encouraged their students to participate, to the willing volunteers at Sovereign with special mentions to Valerie Urrunaga, Susanne Boorman, Enzo La Pietra, Angela Manduca, Pinky Diola, Bronte Griffiths, and Cristina Cassar Difesa, the judges and finally all those who provided additional support.

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THE SOVEREIGN ART FOUNDATION



The Sovereign Art Foundation (SAF) is a charitable organisation that was founded in 2003 to recognise and promote contemporary art talent around the world and bring the benefits of expressive arts to disadvantaged children.

In the same year, SAF launched The Sovereign Asian Art Prize, now recognised as the most established and prestigious annual art award in Asia-Pacific. Two further professional prizes have since been launched in Africa and Portugal. The Prizes aim to increase the international exposure of artists and support their development, whilst raising funds by auctioning shortlisted artworks and sharing proceeds equally between the participating artists and charitable programmes for disadvantaged children. This model has so far raised over US\$11 million for artists and charities worldwide.

SAF also runs a series of Students Prizes, annual awards that celebrate the importance of art in the education system and recognise the quality of artworks produced by secondary-school students across the world. The first SAF Students Prize was established in 2012 in Hong Kong, followed by Guernsey, Bahrain, Singapore, Mauritius, Portugal, the Isle of Man, Malta and Gozo, Gibraltar, and London.

This year SAF celebrated 20 years of art prizes with a charity exhibition at Art Central Hong Kong, inviting both professionals and student finalist from all jurisdictions to donate a piece of artwork for the cause.

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THE SOVEREIGN ART FOUNDATION STUDENTS PRIZE MALTA & GOZO

The Sovereign Art Foundation Students Prize was established in Malta and Gozo in 2017. It has welcomed art pieces from multiple schools on the islands, always with the belief that art plays a vital role in fostering creativity and building confidence in children and young adults.

This year we witnessed a record-breaking number of entries of which twenty finalists were selected by our international judging panel.

Throughout the month of March, the Hilton Hotel in St. Julian's once again became a vibrant gallery showcasing our finalists' creations. This year we had a number of students auctioning their artwork. Out of the 20 artworks showcased, two winners were selected, one chosen by the judges and the other by the voices of the public.

The two winners will be revealed on Thursday 18th of April 2024 at our Awards Ceremony and followed through on social media platforms.

THE SAF GLOBAL STUDENT PRIZE



The Sovereign Art Foundation and Camp Willingness, our chosen charity, share the belief that emotional intelligence is a skill that can be nurtured and developed, rather than an inherent trait through art. This shared conviction forms the cornerstone of both of our foundations.

Recognizing the challenges children face in today's fast-paced world, Camp Willingness provides a secure and nurturing environment conducive to fostering healthy emotional growth in a series of workshops and summer camps.

This year €1,800 was raised and awarded to this initiative. A distinctive aspect of Camp Willingness is its therapeutic designed, theme-based camps during school vacations. She started formal art tuition at the Convent of the Sacred Heart in St Julians under Margaret Chircop. She later graduated from the Malta government school of art where she was under the tutelage of Harry Alden. She was later awarded a diploma in Cartooning by the International Correspondence School in the UK. She hails from Sliema but resides in Siggiewi. Debbie Caruana Dingli has been a recognised presence on the local art scene for the past thirty-five years and her accomplishments in portraiture and cartoon painting have played a significant role in establishing her solid reputation. Her interest in observing people from all social strata, both collectively as well as individually, has continually provided her with a rich and varied stock of imagery. There is no doubt that her artistic compass is oriented towards sketching and drawing people. Whilst her portraiture has until now been executed in a realistic vein,' her cartoon paintings draw freely on both her imagination and on her personal memories. Caruana Dinglis realistic style as well as her imagined scenarios originate from the same well of ideas and are inspired by people from all walks of life. Her personal observations go beyond mere people watching' and affirm an enduring interest in the human condition. They also indicate an awareness of topical social issues as well as a genuine concern for nature and the environment on our island








